

What does leadership mean in prisons?

The lectures will be chaired by Omar Khan, director of the race equality thinktank the Runnymede Trust.

Prisons are under scrutiny like never before and have faced much public criticism. With self-harm and violence in prisons at record highs, stubbornly high reoffending rates and a toxic mix of mental ill-health, trauma and drug misuse the challenge of trying to Change Lives within prison walls is vast.

In prisons, leadership skills are required of all staff, not just Governors or Managers.

- > What styles of leadership are most effective in prisons?
- Is a different approach needed to solve the current 'crisis'?
 - Who sets the values and shapes a prison culture?
- > How do staff influence those people in their care to turn their lives around?

At this year's lectures we will explore the roles leaders play, their impact on services, and models of effective leadership.

The Lectures will draw on a wide range of expert speakers, including Michael Spurr, former Chief Executive Officer of HM Prison and Probation Service, Dr. Jamie Bennett, Governor of HMP Long Lartin, Dr Kate Gooch, Associate Professor at the University of Bath, and Dr Sarah Lewis & Stephen Robertson from HMP Guys Marsh. It promises to be a thought-provoking discussion, generating ideas about good practice.

The text of the lectures is reproduced in full in the Prison Service Journal.


The Perrie Lectures Committee is independent and non-profit.

Bill Perrie

Bill retired from HM Prison Service in 1987 after 32 years of working in prisons, governing HMPs Hull, Long Lartin and Winson Green. A renowned practitioner, Bill contributed much to the development of hostels, working out schemes and regimes for long term prisoners.

In 1986 he attended the first lectures, named after him. He continued to support them right up until 1997. Sadly Bill died on 15th November 1997. He was considered one of the preeminent Governors of his era.

Throughout his career he was ever aware of the essential humanity of his staff and charges. His inspiration and support are greatly missed.
